I believe there is no better model for understanding and appreciating the intersection of religion and politics than Martin Luther King, Jr., whom we remember and celebrate in today's liturgy and whose birth we observe tomorrow.

Dr. King's deep and abiding faith informed his prophetic voice, vision and witness as he fought to secure civil and voting rights, jobs and decent wages, health care and decent education, peace and justice for all. On the last Sunday of his life, Dr. King stood in the pulpit of the Washington National

Cathedral and spoke passionately of all these concerns—racism, poverty, war. He climbed that mountain and kept on shining, and his light has continued to shine in spite of the efforts of some to put it out.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday tomorrow marks the 25th anniversary of the day of service that celebrates the Civil Rights leader's life and legacy. Observed each year on the third Monday in January as "a day on, not a day off," MLK Day is the only federal holiday designated as a national day of service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities.

In accordance with the Church's Bylaws, the Vestry has set the time and place for the annual parish meeting and vestry election. These will take place on Sunday, February **23 at 10 am in the nave of the Church**. All are invited to attend. Only qualified voters are eligible to vote. The Vestry has nominated the following people for election: John B. Gilliland to serve a second 2-year term as Warden; Archer Christian Burke to serve a second 3-year term as a Vestry member; four individuals each to serve an initial 3-year term as a Vestry member: William ("Bill") Fry IV, Astrid Horan, J Patrick Hornbeck II, and Mary Robin Jurkiewicz. Nominees' biographies will be posted at stbarts.org/annualmeeting on January 15. These will also be available in hard copy form in the Church starting February 9 through February 23.

Two matters proposed for vote at The Annual Parish Meeting: The Vestry resolved to seek parish approval for two amendments to the certificate of incorporation. One amendment would effect an update of the legal name and title of the corporation to "St. Bartholomew's Church in the City of New York." (The current legal corporate name and title was established in 1835 and is "The Rector, Church Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Bartholomew's Church in the City of New York.") The other amendment is corporate "housekeeping" to fix an outer bound for the annual meeting and vestry election date each year. (The date is currently wholly unfixed.) The Vestry requests that the parish vote FOR each of these amendments at the annual meeting. Each amendment is presented in greater detail, together with the rationale for it, at stbarts.org/amendments. This information will also be available in hard copy form in the Church starting February 9 through February 23.
